# Spring 2018 – 2020 – on hiatus due to COVID-19

Federal Bureau of Prisons, Wilmot Complex, Cholla Unit (Women), Women's Relationships

Description: Weekly workshop on women's relationship curriculum and humanities.

Workshops conducted in Spanish consists of readings and discussions tied to women's relationships, recognizing patterns in relationships and reflection on changes that improve and focus on women's wellness. Twelve to 14 women per workshop.

Leadership and Impact in Community: Women incarcerated in Federal Bureau of Prisons Tucson Sector are housed in one unit with an average population of 34 women. The majority of women are Mexican nationals who are primarily Spanish monolingual. Education services to women are very limited. This work is unique and reflects SIROW's outreach to marginalized women. Andrade has developed a methodology for facilitating women's groups utilizing the humanities to engage women in discussions on personal development and improved personal outcomes in current and future relationships.
